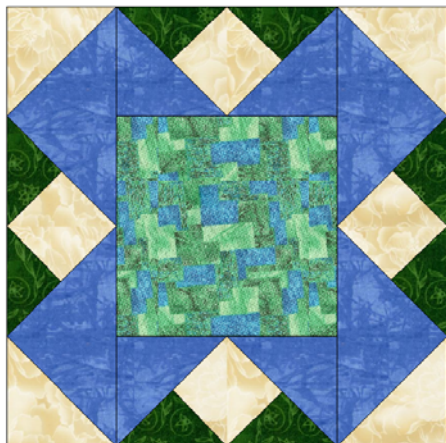


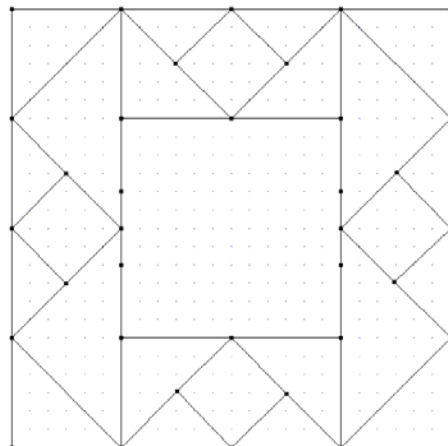
# Salt Lake City

12 inches finished



I don't really know why this is called Salt Lake City - but I have several references to the square by this name.

I do like the shape of the block, and it does show off that centre fabric!



## Background:



4 - 2 5/8 inch squares  
2 - 3 7/8 inch squares for the half square triangles (cut once diagonally)  
(or 4 triangles cut from 3 1/2 inch strip with the Half Square or Easy angle ruler)



## Centre



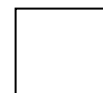
1 - 6 1/2 inch square



## Half and quarter triangles



2 - 3 7/8 inch squares for the half square triangles (cut once diagonally)  
(or 4 triangles cut from 3 1/2 inch strip with the Half Square or Easy angle ruler)  
1 - 7 1/4 inch square for the quarter square triangles (cut twice diagonally)  
(or 8 triangles cut from 3 1/2 inch strip with a Quarter square or Companion Angle Triangle Ruler)



## Quarter Square Triangles



2 - 4 1/4 inch square for the quarter square triangles (cut twice diagonally)  
(or 8 triangles cut from 2 inch strip with a Quarter square or Companion Angle Triangle Ruler)



This block seems to be all triangles - but lets start with the background squares. Sew a small dark triangle to two adjacent sides of each background square. Remember we need the straight of grain on the outside of our finished square, so you are sewing bias edges to the straight edge of the square.



That was pretty easy - wasn't it? Now, on two of these sections, sew the small half square light triangles:



On the other two, sew two of the larger quarter square triangles:



Finally, sew on the background half square triangles:



Now, place your pieces as shown in the block at the top of the first page, and sew the sections together.

Admit it, that was a lot easier than you thought!
