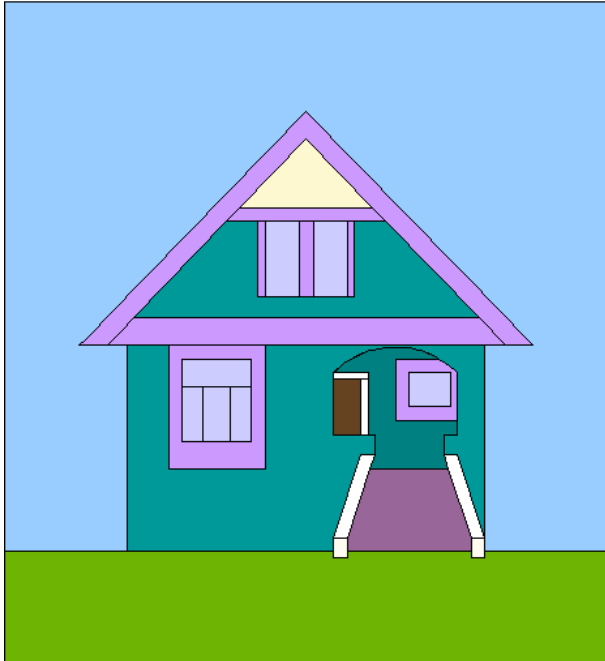


House #10

10 by 12 inches finished



10 ½ by 12 ½ inches unfinished or

Yes, this house really is teal, several shades of purple, with a yellow top to the gable. Look closely at the picture and you will see that the trim is not just lengths of wood, they are intricate - almost delicate pieces of art.

Go wild with this one - use ribbons and lace trims to have fun. It really is a masterpiece.

We are going to handle the curved front on the porch by appliqueing it over the door and window. The white trim on the railings and the posts at the bottom of the stairs will be applied.



Sky

2 - 2 ¾ by 4 ¼ inches (C)

Plus pieces for Sections B1, B2

1 - 2 ¼ by 3 ¾ inches (D)

2 - 1 by 4 ¼ inches (E)

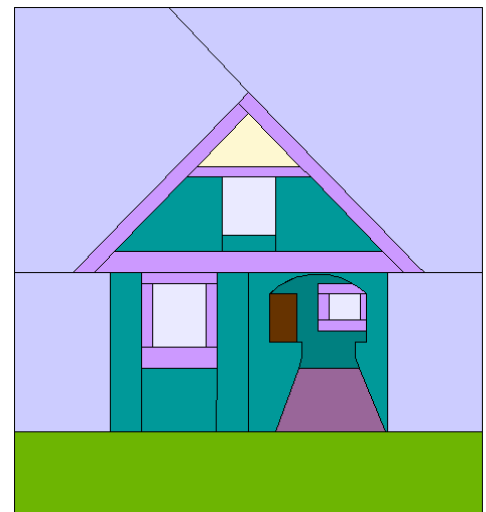

12 ½ by 2 ½ inches (Q)

Plus small pieces for Paper Piecing Section A

Starting at the top:

Paper Piece the first floor - Section A. Start with the window - you might want to place the center upright before doing the A1/A2 seam. And add some lace to represent the gingerbread on piece A7.

Sew the Sky pieces B1 and B2 either side of the paper pieced section. Note that the pieces are templates so don't reverse them.

Now you have the upper floor finished. On to the main floor...

For the main level, add $\frac{3}{4}$ inch trim to the right and left of the window L. Then add a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch trim strip to the top, and a 1 inch trim to the bottom of the window. This should measure $2\frac{3}{4}$ by $1\frac{3}{4}$.

Add siding D below the window, and siding pieces E to either side.

This should measure $5\frac{1}{4}$ by $4\frac{1}{4}$ inches.

Place the two porch right side together, place the pattern piece on top, and sew on the solid line inside the porch. (You could trace it if the siding is light, or cut it out and draw a pencil line around the open area).

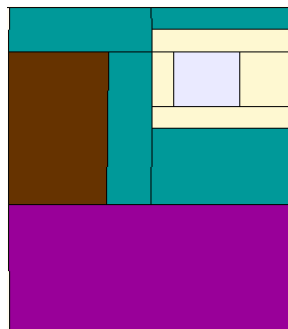
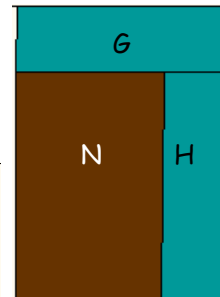
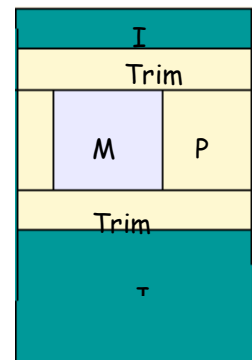
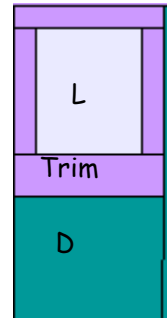
Turn this right sides out, and press.

Now, for inside the porch. Sew a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch strip of trim to the left side of the window M, and the Trim piece P to the right. Add two $\frac{3}{4}$ inch strips to the top and bottom of this piece. Add Siding piece I to the top and J to the bottom.

Next sew Siding I to the right of the door N, and top it with siding piece G. If you want to put trim on the door, do it now.

Sew the door section to the left of the window, and sew the stairs O below the section. At this point you might want to draw, paint, or embroider the steps.

This section will measure $3\frac{3}{4}$ by $4\frac{1}{4}$

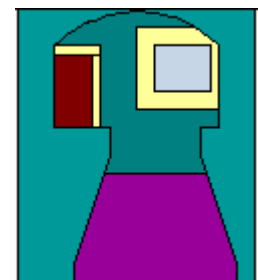


Lay the porch overlay over the porch. Baste the two together or sew carefully around outside. Treat this section as one piece. Sew the piece to the right side of the main floor.

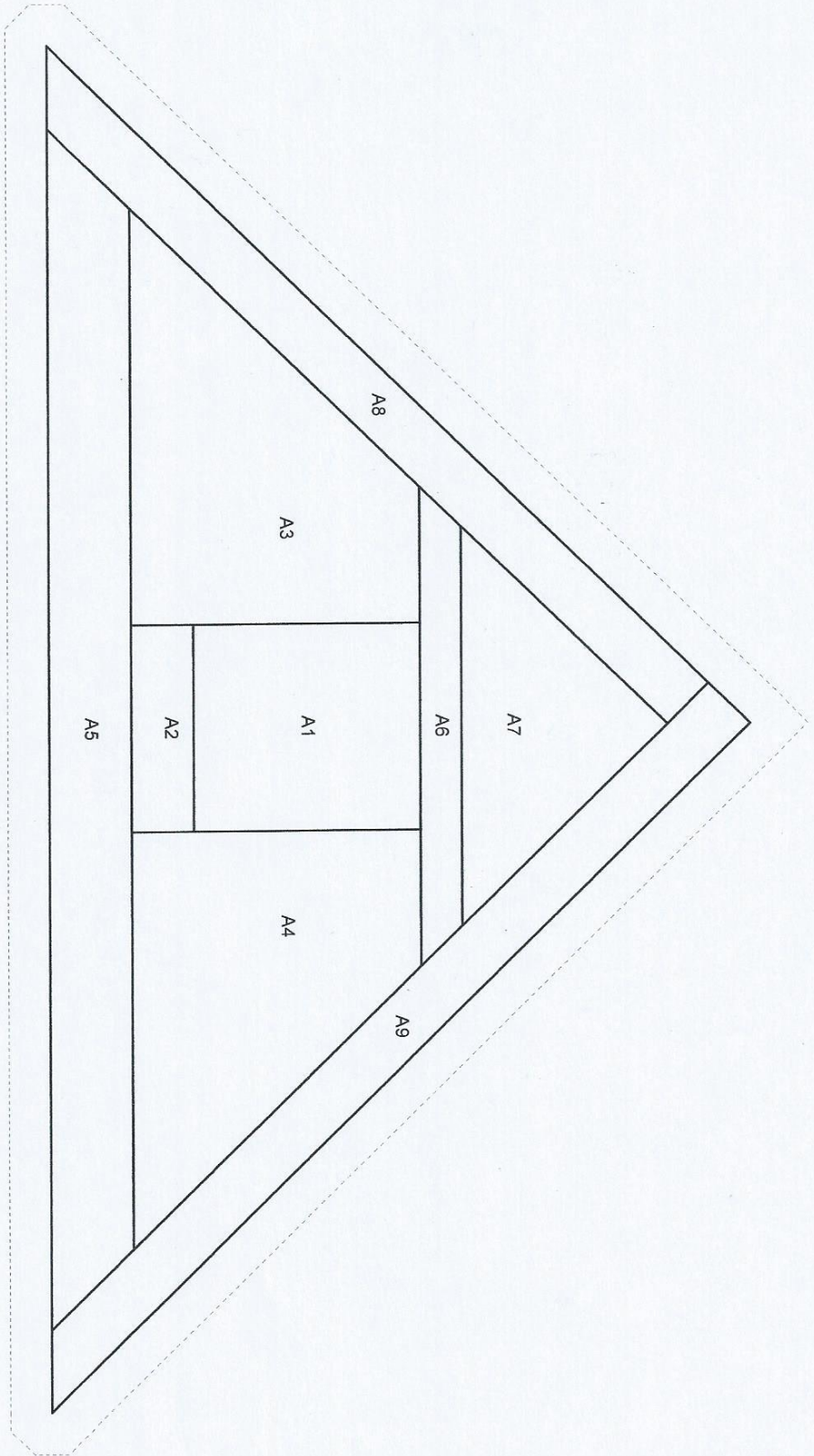
Sew a Sky piece C to each side of the house.

Sew the top story to the main floor and add the front yard to the bottom.

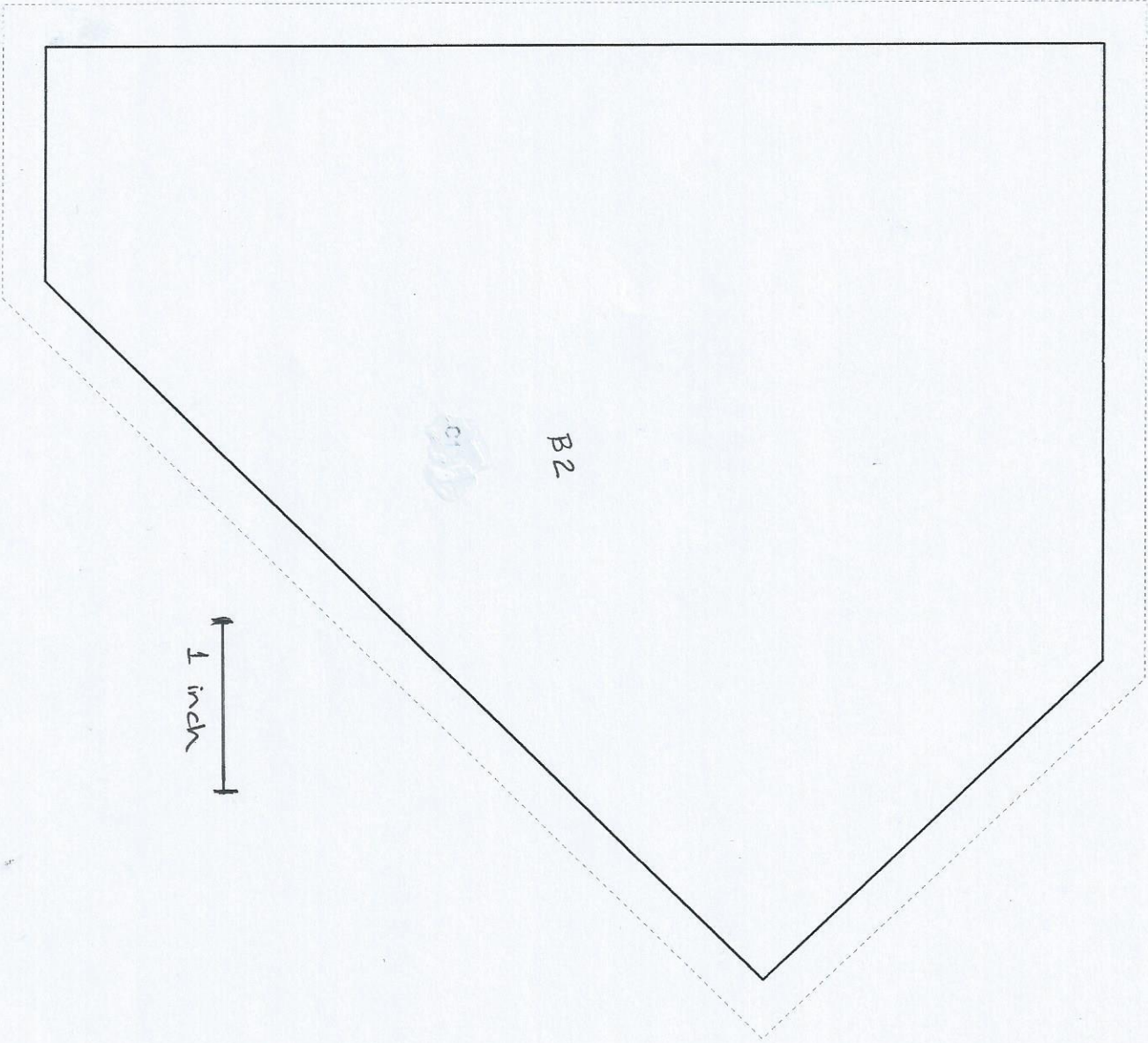
Add the white trim the stairs (1/2 inch wide), and have fun finishing this house.



House #10 - Piecing Diagram



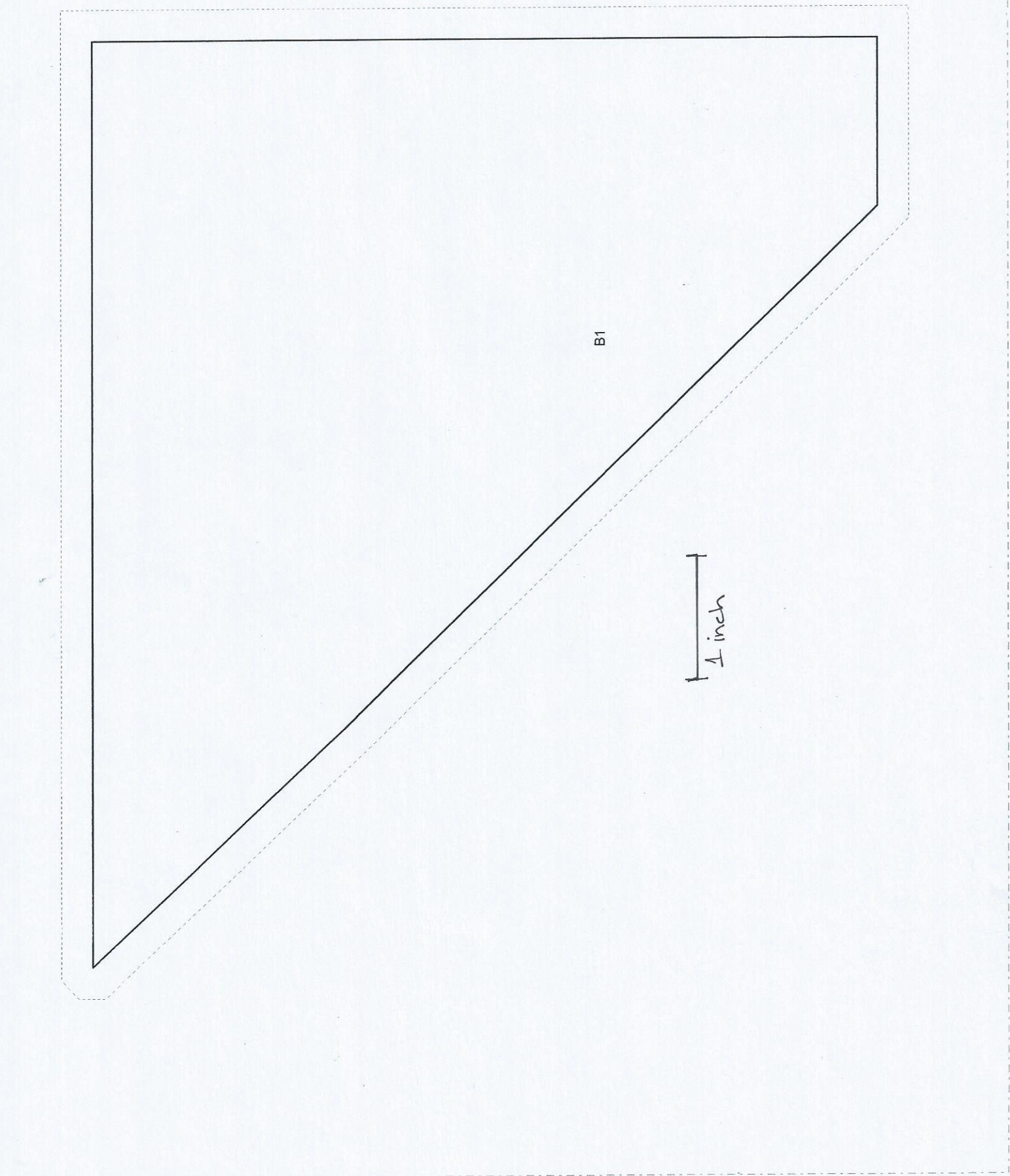

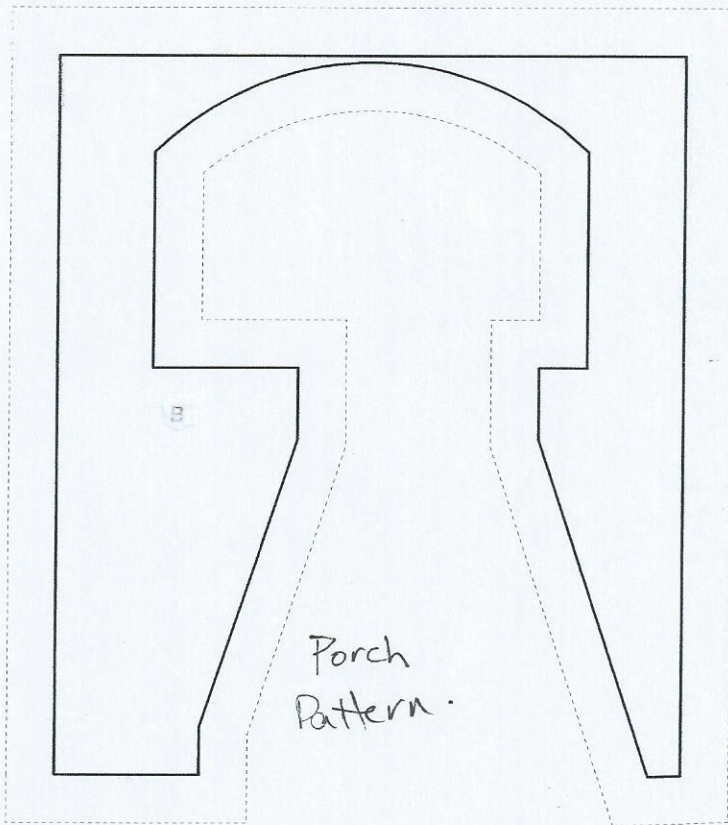
