



Log Cabin

10 inch finished block

By varying the size of the centre of the cabin, and the number and colour of the logs, you can vary the look of the block. This is a great block to build a medallion on.



Colour the block on the right with the colours of your choice




FOR THE BOM: the colour of the month is orange. From pale peach to bright pumpkin - think of all the orangy autumn colours. Choose a cream for the light, and two prints with orange in them for the dots and bricks - the darker of the two should be the dots. Then for the dark fabric, use the green provided at the meeting. If you weren't at the meeting, just leave it and whoever wins the blocks will add the dark strips. The rest of the green fabric will go to the winner of the blocks in November!

Cutting:


Fabric	Size	Number
	3 1/2 inch square	1
	1 1/2 inch strip (width of fabric)	1
	1 1/2 inch strip (width of fabric)	1
	1 1/2 inch strip (1/2 width of fabric)	1

Construction:


When I make log cabin blocks, I do not cut the logs individually. This helps me to keep the block square. After adding each log, press the seam, place the ruler line on the last line sewn, and trim perpendicular to that line.



This is a basic building block that can be used to build some interesting quilts - along or in combination with other blocks:



This quilt was made with just two colours and no sashing. Or you can use the darker strips to make a shape within your quilt. Play with the size of the strips and the centre block and you can do almost anything - any size.



If you are making the sampler:

Make four blocks and rotate them as shown in the sampler diagram. You can use a single fabric for the strips - or use several fabrics of the same colour families.
